

SCOUTS TO OPEN CAMP JUNE 19

Trained Leaders to Direct Summer Activities.

Mishawaka Boy Scouts will officially open Camp Mishawaka, Stone lake, Lagrange county, Indiana, for the summer season June 19. They will hold their annual two-week camping period under the guidance of adult leaders who have received additional youth leadership training during the winter months.

Lee Ostrander, local scout executive, said Saturday that work of further landscaping and the replanting of more trees, together with reconditioning of buildings at the camp and the repairing of outdoor equipment at the camp, will get under way within several weeks with the scouts doing the work.

Immediately following the close of the two-week camping period for scouts on July 2, Mishawaka Camp Fire Girls will take over for a six-week outing period. About 250 girls attended the camp during a similar period last year. Their leaders also have received additional training, and a carefully planned program of instructive and entertaining activities has been arranged.

To Open Reservation.

Although no definite date has been set for the opening of the scout reservation on South Capital avenue, it was indicated Saturday it would follow immediately after the scout camping period at Camp Mishawaka, July 2. As in previous years the reservation will be open throughout the summer and early fall as a day camp. It will be available for overnight troop or cub outings under adult supervision. The reservation, which covers a 15-acre tract, is owned by scout parents and council members.

Scout troop No. 4, sponsored by the Beiger school P.T.A. is spending this week end at Camp Mishawaka, the second outing this year for that unit. Their camp leaders are E. G. H. Bargmeyer and Walter Anderson.

Cub Leaders Trained.

The final session in a series of training courses for Cub Scout leaders will be held at 7:30 p. m.

Monday in the Main Junior High school study hall. Moving pictures on cub scouting will be shown, after which there will be a discussion on summer activities. Thirty training course certificates will be awarded to leaders who have completed their training.
