GIRLS' CAMP TO OPEN JUNE 20

Capacity Enrollment Expected for Season.

Plans are being completed for the opening June 20 of Camp Tannadonah, the Camp Fire retreat on a wooded hill overlooking Birch lake, near Van Wert, Mich. The season is expected to include new features and will be in operation through Aug. 21, the nine weeks to be divided into two and one week periods. Girls may register for as long a period as they wish and the list of admissions is being kept. A vacancy exists for all periods in anticipation.

The South Bend branch of Camp Fire Girls is operating the camp for the 17th consecutive season. The national office of the organization is at 1100 N. Dearborn St., Detroit, Mich. Miss Dorothy E. Add Two Boats.

Additional waterfront equipment includes two boats donated in the girls by the Exchange club; Quillery and new canoe will be on the lake. New handicraft projects include a plank boat, canoe and motor canoes and girls will have a chance to make dollhouses. A graduate nurse will be in charge of camp health and water for both bathing and swimming to carefully tested before and during the camping season.

A. A. U. W. HEARS DR. GILBRETH Tells How to Meet Challenge of Today.

"If we can be proud of the past, make ourselves applicants of its contributions in the present, but concentrate our chief enthusiasm on the ideals we must accomplish in the future, we will have met the challenge of today," Dr. Lillian Gilbreth, of Monticello, N. J., a consulting engineer in industrial management and a great professor at Purdue university, was the guest speaker at a luncheon of the South Bend branch of the Association of University Women in the club house of the South Bend Country club following a luncheon. It was the final session of a two-day annual convention of women at Purdue university, presented by Dr. Gilbreth.

"Education is a complete failure if it does not result in a Ph. D. degree, considers the education of an era," Dr. Gilbreth said. "Any program which does not stop at the university level is not an education. It is a preparation for the job of education must go on and on. No matter in what field a person is interested primarily, he should be prepared to transfer all around and on what is going on in every field.

"It is coming to me to hear of the pendulum 'swinging back' to old time theories of education. The movement is not of a pendulum swinging back, but of an equalizing force. The pendulum brings the education of the other it is on a higher level until another pendulum swings back to the old theories of education."

Dr. Gilbreth spoke of the joys of Purdue which claim the research activities of various groups and pointed out that education would be an ideal approach to many of our problems.
